### **OBJECTIVE**

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide the City Council and Housing Authority Commission the Housing Authority Annual Report as Housing Authority and Housing Successor for Fiscal Year 2016-2017.

In 2014, the Governor signed into law SB 341 requiring Housing Successors to conduct an annual report of their housing activities associated with the assumed assets and functions of the Former Agency. The required report is attached and includes all of the sections required by the statute. Additionally, the report will be formally placed on the City Council and Housing Authority agenda to receive and file at the January 23, 2018 meeting. Furthermore, as required, this report and its attachments are being provided to the Housing Successor and will be posted on the City's website by December 31, 2017.

# GARDEN GROVE HOUSING AUTHORITY ANNUAL REPORT AS HOUSING AUTHORITY AND AS HOUSING SUCCESSOR FOR FISCAL YEAR 2016-2017 UNDER CALIFORNIA HEALTH & SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 34176.1 AND 34328

This Annual Report of the Garden Grove Housing Authority (GGHA) is prepared under California Health and Safety Code (HSC), Section 34176.1 as the housing successor, and Section 34328 as a housing authority (together, Report). In particular, Division 24 of the HSC sets forth the Dissolution Law in Parts 1.8 and 1.85 and the Housing Authorities Law in Part 2, which respectively require preparation of an annual report on the housing successor and the housing authority's activities for the prior fiscal year. This Report details the GGHA's activities during Fiscal Year (FY) 2016-2017 and is intended to satisfy the requirements under both HSC Sections 34328 and 34176.1. In particular, this Report details the GGHA's activities for FY 2016-2017, including the information required about the Low and Moderate Income Housing Asset Fund (LMIHAF) and on other information under Section 34176.1(f). After receipt of the complete, final CAFR (term defined below) that is expected by the end of December 2017, then this Report will be finalized using data in the CAFR and will be provided to, and will be presented for joint consideration and action by the City Council and Housing Authority Board in January 2018.

This Report includes information prepared by City staff on behalf of the GGHA and data from the independent financial audit of the Low and Moderate Income Housing Asset Fund Financial Report for FY 2016-2017 (CAFR) as prepared by Davis Farr LLP, which audit is separate from this Report; further, this Report conforms with and is organized into sections I. through XIV., inclusive, under Section 34176.1(f) of the Dissolution Law:

- I. Amounts Received and Deposited Under 34191.4(b)(3)(A). This section provides the total amount of funds paid to the City and the amount deposited into the LMIHAF allocable to 20% of the repayments on the reinstated City/Agency loan(s), if any, per Section 34191.4.
- II. Amount Deposited into LMIHAF. This section provides the total amount of funds deposited into the LMIHAF in FY 16-17 and itemized by amounts deposited in FY 16-17 for items listed on Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS), amounts allocable to Section 34191.4 deposits, and other amounts deposited into the LMIHAF.
- III. Ending Balance of LMIHAF. This section provides a statement of the balance in the LMIHAF as of the close of FY 16-17. Any amounts deposited for items listed on the ROPS, and amounts allocable to Section 34191.4 deposits, must be distinguished from the other amounts deposited.
- IV. Description of Expenditures from LMIHAF. This section provides a description of expenditures made from the LMIHAF during FY 16-17. The expenditures are to be categorized among (A) administration for monitoring, preserving covenanted housing units, (B) homeless prevention and rapid rehousing services and (C) development of housing.

- V. Statutory Value of Assets Owned by Housing Successor. This section provides the statutory value of real property owned by the Housing Successor, the value of loans and grants receivables, and the sum of these two amounts.
- VI. Description of Transfers. This section describes transfers, if any, to another housing successor made in previous fiscal year(s), including whether the funds are unencumbered and the status of projects, if any, for which the transferred LMIHAF will be used. The sole purpose of the transfers must be for development of transit priority projects, permanent supportive housing, housing for agricultural employees or special needs housing.
- VII. Project Descriptions. This section describes any project for which the Housing Successor receives or holds property tax revenue under the ROPS and the status of that project.
- VIII. Status of Compliance with Section 33334.16. As and if applicable, this section provides a status update on compliance with Section 33334.16 for interests in real property acquired by the former redevelopment agency prior to February 1, 2012. For interests in real property acquired on or after February 1, 2012, provide a status update on the project.
- IX. Description of Outstanding Obligations under Section 33413. This section describes outstanding inclusionary and replacement housing obligations, if any, under Section 33413 that remained outstanding prior to dissolution of the former redevelopment agency as of February 1, 2012, along with the Housing Successor's progress in meeting those prior obligations, if any, of the former redevelopment agency and how the Housing Successor's plans to meet unmet obligations, if any.
- X. Income Test. This section provides information required by Section 34176.1(a)(3)(B), or a description of expenditures by income category and restriction for the applicable five-year period, with the time period beginning January 1, 2014 and whether the statutory thresholds have been met. However, reporting of the Income Test is not required until 2019.
- XI. Senior Housing Test. This section provides the percentage of deed-restricted rental housing units restricted to seniors and assisted individually or jointly by the Housing Successor, its former redevelopment agency, and its host jurisdiction within the previous 10 years in relation to the aggregate number of units of deed-restricted rental housing assisted individually or jointly by the Housing Successor, its former redevelopment agency and its host jurisdiction within the same 10-year time period.
- XII. Excess Surplus Test: This section provides the amount of excess surplus in the LMIHAF, if any, and the length of time that the Housing Successor has had excess surplus, and the Housing Successor's plan for eliminating the excess surplus.
- XIII. Inventory of Homeownership Units: This section provides a summary of covenanted homeownership units assisted by the former redevelopment agency or the housing successor that include equity sharing and repayment provisions, including: (A) number of units; (B) number of units lost to the portfolio in the last

fiscal year and the reason for those losses, and (C) any funds returned to the housing successor due to losses or repayments.

XIV. Additional Information: GGHA's Activities for the Preceding Year FY 16-17 under HSC Section 34328.

This Report is to be provided to the Housing Successor's governing body by December 31, 2017. # I. AMOUNT RECEIVED BY THE CITY PER HSC SECTION 34191.4

A total of \$0.00 was received by the City in repayment of reinstated City/Agency loans per Section 34191.4.

### II. AMOUNT DEPOSITED INTO LMIHAF

A total of \$369,203 was deposited into the LMIHAF during the Fiscal Year. Of the total funds deposited into the LMIHAF, a total of \$0 was held for items listed on the ROPS, [or received pursuant to Health and Safety Code Section 34191.4(b)(3)(B) or (C).]

### III. ENDING BALANCE OF LMIHAF

At the close of the Fiscal Year, the ending balance in the LMIHAF was \$704,604 (2016-17 CAFR), of which \$0 is held for items listed on the ROPS.

### IV. DESCRIPTION OF EXPENDITURES FROM LMIHAF

The following is a description of expenditures from the LMIHAF by category:

The administrative expenditures total less than five percent of the statutory value of real property owned by the Housing Successor and of loans and grants receivable held by the Housing Successor.

# V. STATUTORY VALUE OF HOUSING ASSETS OWNED BY HOUSING SUCCESSOR IN LMIHAF

Under the Dissolution Law and for purposes of this Report, the "statutory value of real property" means the value of properties formerly held by the former redevelopment agency as listed on the housing asset transfer schedule (HAT) approved by the Department of Finance (DOF) as listed in HAT under Section 34176(a)(2), the value of the properties transferred to the Housing Successor pursuant to Section 34181(f), and the purchase price of property(ies) purchased by the Housing Successor. Further, the value of loans and grants receivable is included in these reported assets held in the LMIHAF.

# VI. DESCRIPTION OF TRANSFERS

The Housing Successor did not make any LMIHAF transfers to other Housing Successor(s) under Section 34176.1(c)(2) during the Fiscal Year.

### VII. PROJECT DESCRIPTIONS

The Housing Successor does not receive or hold property tax revenue pursuant to the ROPS.

### VIII. STATUS OF COMPLIANCE WITH SECTION 33334.16

Section 34176.1 provides that Section 33334.16 does not apply to interests in real property acquired by the Housing Successor on or after February 1, 2012; nevertheless, this Report presents a status update on the project related to such real property.

With respect to interests in real property acquired by the former redevelopment agency *prior* to February 1, 2012, the time periods described in Section 33334.16 shall be deemed to have commenced on the date that the Department of Finance approved the property as a housing asset

in the LMIHAF; thus, as to real property acquired by the former redevelopment agency now held by the Housing Successor in the LMIHAF, the Housing Successor must initiate activities consistent with the development of the real property for the purpose for which it was acquired within five years of the date the DOF approved such property as a housing asset on the HAT.

The Successor Agency, Housing Successor, and City are pursuing affordable housing development opportunities to meet the requirements set forth in the Settlement Agreement.

# X. EXTREMELY-LOW INCOME TEST

Section 34176.1(a)(3)(A) requires that the Housing Successor must require at least 30% of the LMIHAF to be expended for development of rental housing affordable to and occupied by households earning 30% or less of the AMI. Pursuant to Section 34176.1(a)(3)(B), if the Housing Successor fails to comply with the Extremely-Low Income requirement in any five-year report, then the Housing Successor must ensure that at least 50% of the funds remaining in the LMIHAF be expended in each fiscal year following the latest fiscal year following the report on households earning 30% or less of the AMI until the Housing Successor demonstrates compliance with the Extremely-Low Income requirement. This information is not required to be reported until 2019 for the 2014 – 2019 period, which is the first of the five-year periods added by Section 34176.1.

### XI. SENIOR HOUSING TEST

The Housing Successor is to calculate the percentage of units of deed-restricted rental housing restricted to seniors and assisted by the Housing Successor, the former redevelopment agency and/or the City within the previous 10 years in relation to the aggregate number of units of deed-restricted rental housing assisted by the Housing Successor, the former redevelopment agency and/or City within the same time period. If this percentage exceeds 50%, then the Housing Successor cannot expend future funds in the LMIHAF to assist additional senior housing

units until the Housing Successor or City assists and construction has commenced on a number of restricted rental units that is equal to 50% of the total amount of deed-restricted rental units.

### XII. EXCESS SURPLUS TEST

Excess Surplus is defined in Section 34176.1(d) as an unencumbered amount in the account that exceeds the greater of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) or the aggregate amount deposited into the account during the Housing Successor's preceding four Fiscal Years, whichever is greater.

The City's Neighborhood Improvement Division administered a majority of the former Agency's Single Family Rehabilitation Program and First Time Homebuyer Program. The Neighborhood Improvement Division does have an existing agreement with Amerinational Community Services, Inc., a Minnesota Corporation relating to certain, but not all, aspects of administration of the former Agency's Single Family Rehabilitation loans and First Time Homebuyer loans that provided second lien mortgages for homeownership units. These consulting services include assistance with oversight and

administration of amortized loan payments, if any, due; with tracking and calculation of loan balances in the event of payoff; and, other administrative activities for these outstanding Single Family Rehab and Fist Time Homebuyer loans. Additionally, the City has contracted with AIM Asset Property Management for property management services.

# XIV. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION ABOUT GARDEN GROVE HOUSING AUTHORITY'S ACTIVITIES FOR THE PRECEDING YEAR FY 16-17 PER HSC SECTION 34328

The Housing Authority can provide rental assistance to 2,337 households per month through Section 8 vouchers. The lease up rate by month for FY 2016-17 was as follows:

Additionally, the Housing Authority also administers a Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program for the City's Neighborhood Improvement Division funded with HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME) funds from the Department of Housing and Urban Development. During FY 2016-17, the Housing Authority provided a total of 4 Tenant Based Rental Assistance vouchers.

Development ("Successor Agency"), the Garden Grove Housing Authority as Successor Agency to the Garden Grove Agency for Community Development ("Housing Successor") and the Garden Grove City Council (collectively, "Defendants"), hereby enter into this stipulation to substitute party and for entry of judgment ("Judgment"). Plaintiffs and Defendants (collectively, "Parties") settled the above-captioned matter through Voluntary Settlement Conferences before Judge Gail Andler, Department CX-101, on September 20, 2013 and February 28, 2014. The Parties stipulate as follows:

- 1. On September 20, 2013, the Parties entered into a settlement on the record in open court in Department CX-101 that resolved the above captioned matter conditioned upon the settlement of the issue of attorneys' fees. On February 28, 2014, the Parties reached agreement on attorneys' fees. The terms of the settlement are as follows:
- The term "Low Income Households" shall have the meaning set forth in Health and Safety Code section 50079.5.
- The term "Very Low Income Households" shall have the meaning set forth in.
   Health and Safety Code section 50105.
- 4. The term "Low Income Rent" shall be rent affordable to lower income households as set forth in Health and Safety Code section 50053(b)(3).
- 5. The term "Very Low Income Rent" shall be rent affordable to very low income households as set forth in Health and Safety Code section 50053(b)(2).
- 6. Within the timeframe described in Paragraph 9, below, the Successor Agency or, at its discretion, the Housing Successor (hereinafter "Successors"), shall develop replacement housing. Pursuant to this paragraph funds held in the Low and Möderate Income Housing Asset Fund, as defined in Health and Safety Code section 34176, shall be available for development of the replacement housing pursuant to this Judgment. The Successors shall develop or cause to be developed twenty five (25) additional new construction dwelling units as replacement housing for the Travel Country Recreational Vehicle Park ("Park") to address Plaintiffs' claims for development of replacement housing pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 33413. No less

than twelve (12) of the units developed pursuant to this paragraph shall be covenanted to be leased at Very Low Income Rent and restricted to occupancy by Very Low Income Households; the balance of thirteen (13) units shall be covenanted to be leased at Low Income Rent and restricted to occupancy by Low Income Households.

7. In addition to the dwelling units described in Paragraph 6, within the timeframe described in Paragraph 9, below Successors shall develop or cause to be developed thirteen (13) additional dwelling units, either as new construction or Substantial Rehabilitation (as defined below), as replacement housing for the Park to address Plaintiffs' claims for development of replacement housing pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 33413. No less than seven (7) of the units developed pursuant to this paragraph shall be covenanted to be leased at Very Low Income Rent and restricted to occupancy by Very Low Income Households, the balance of six (6) units shall be covenanted to be leased at Low Income Rent and restricted to occupancy by Low Income Households.

8. The Successors may reduce the number of dwelling units required to be developed pursuant to Paragraph 7 (but not Paragraph 6) by one dwelling unit for each dwelling unit offered to a household listed on Exhibit A or B hereto that is rejected by such household provided that a household's rejection of a unit under this section will not disqualify that household from eligibility under Paragraph 11. In order to reduce the unit count, (1) a displaced household must receive an offer of affordable replacement housing after a determination (provided to the displaced household in writing) by the operator of that housing that the displaced household is eligible for occupancy of the replacement housing with respect to all of its qualifications and restrictions, including but not limited to income, family size, rental history and credit score, (2) the offer of affordable housing must be either hand delivered to the displaced household as evidenced by a proof of personal service, or through regular and certified U.S. mail, and (3) the displaced household must be allowed ten (10) business days after receipt of the offer to accept or reject the offer.

9. The Successors shall develop, rehabilitate, construct or cause the development, rehabilitation or construction (as applicable) of the dwelling units described in Paragraphs 6 and 7 ("Replacement Units") within four years from entry of judgment in this case.

10. "Substantial Rehabilitation" shall have the same meaning as contained in Health and Safety Code section 33413.

11. In accordance with Health and Safety Code section 33411.3, all residents displaced by the Redevelopment Agency shall have priority in occupancy of the Replacement Units developed pursuant to this Judgment. Successors shall provide for such priority in any agreement for development or administration of the Replacement Units, and shall maintain a list of eligible persons and families displaced by the Redevelopment Agency.

12. Defendants shall provide notice to Plaintiffs' counsel upon (1) entry into an agreement for development of Replacement Units, and (2) completion of construction of any replacement dwelling units, no later than ten (10) days after issuance of a certificate of occupancy. The number of required replacement dwelling units shall not be reduced pursuant to Paragraph 8 unless the Successor Agency shall have provided notice (including a copy of the offer) to Plaintiffs' Counsel within five (5) business days of making an offer of affordable housing to a displaced household. Notice to Plaintiffs' counsel pursuant to this paragraph shall be delivered by electronic mail and first class mail to: Public Counsel, Shashi Hanuman, Directing Attorney, Community Development Project, 610 South Ardmore Avenue, Los Angeles, California 90005, shanuman@publiccounsel.org. Parties shall cooperate in the exchange of information relating to any offers.

13. Successor Agency shall pay additional relocation amounts to Individual Plaintiffs based on rents paid in 2003 as initiation of negotiation rents, pursuant to the California Relocation Assistance Act, 25 Code of California Regulations, § 6104, as set forth in the "Total Payment" column of Exhibit A hereto. Successor Agency shall pay additional relocation amounts to all

other former residents of the Park whom they determined to be eligible for relocation assistance, based on rents paid in 2005 as initiation of negotiation rents; pursuant to the California Relocation Assistance Act, 25 Code of California Regulations, § 6104, as set forth in the "Total Payment" column of Exhibit B hereto.

14. Pursuant to action of the California Legislature in Stats. 2012, Ch. 5 (Assembly Bill No. 26, 2011-2012 1st Ex. Sess.) (the "Dissolution Act"), effective June 29, 2011. redevelopment agencies throughout California began a dissolution process. The Dissolution Act provides that the city "that authorized the creation of each redevelopment agency" became the "successor agency" to that redevelopment agency, by operation of law, unless the designated successor entity elected not to serve as the successor agency. California Health and Safety Code sections 34173(a), (d). The Garden Grove City Council adopted resolutions electing to serve as the Successor Agency to the dissolved Redevelopment Agency pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 34173, and designating the Garden Grove Housing Authority as the Housing Successor pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 34176. City of Garden Grove Resolution Nos. 9072-11 (July 12, 2011) and 9089-12 (Jan 17, 2012). As prescribed by the Dissolution Act, the amounts the Successor Agency is obligated to pay pursuant to the terms of this Judgment shall be included as an enforceable obligation of the Successor Agency on each applicable Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule ("ROPS"), as defined in California Health and Safety Code section 34171(h) and in accordance with Health and Safety Code section 34177(l), (m), and as set forth below.

15. The Successor Agency shall include in the ROPS due to be completed and approved by the oversight board of the Successor Agency no later than October 3, 2014, the entire amount of relocation assistance due pursuant to Paragraph 13.

16. The Successor Agency shall include in the ROPS due to be completed and approved by the oversight board of the Successor Agency no later than October 3, 2015 (ROPS 2015-16B), amounts for Replacement Units that will be expended during the January 1, 2016 through June 30, 2016 period. The amounts to be expended during this ROPS 2015-16B period

shall be appropriate to complete development of the Replacement Units for occupancy within four years from entry of the Judgment.

- 17. The Successor Agency shall pay \$795,000 in attorneys' fees to Public Counsel. This amount shall bear interest at the rate of 7 percent per annum, from the date of entry of this Judgment, pursuant to Article XV, Section 1, of the California Constitution. The entire amount of attorneys' fees shall be placed on the ROPS due to be completed by the oversight board of the Successor Agency no later than October 3, 2014 (ROPS 2014-15B).
- 18. Parties agree that the obligations contained herein are obligations of the Garden Grove Agency for Community Development ("Redevelopment Agency"), now dissolved, prior to enactment of the Dissolution Act. Consistent with Health and Safety Code § 34173(e), Successor Agency's liability for amounts owing pursuant to this Judgment shall be limited to the extent of the total sum of property tax revenues the Successor Agency and the Housing Successor receive pursuant to the ROPS process and the value of the assets received by the Successor Agency and the Housing Successor. The Successor Agency shall continue to list the obligations of this Judgment on each ROPS until all obligations required by the Judgment are satisfied.
- 19. Jackgulyn Bodenstedt as executor of the Estate of Randolph Maynor is substituted as a plaintiff in this action in place of plaintiff Randolph Maynor, by reason of his death.
- 20. The Parties agree that the Court shall have continuing jurisdiction to enforce the terms of this settlement and Judgment pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure section 664.6.
- 21. This Stipulation may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which when so executed shall be deemed an original and all of which taken together shall constitute one and the same agreement.

# Homeless Outreach Court Delivers Encouragement, Support and Successful Outcomes

"I'm glad to see you here."

"One step at a time."

"Don't get discouraged."

"Keep up the great work."

These may not be phrases you'd expect to hear in a courtroom handling charges such as low-level misdemeanors, but this encouragement is all part of the Homeless Outreach Court sessions each Wednesday in Orange County.

Homeless individuals facing infractions, low-level misdemeanor offenses and outstanding warrants have a unique opportunity through the Homeless Outreach Court — to participate in a supportive framework that walks them through performing a required eight hours of community service, connecting with permanent housing and finding a stable income — rather than face traditional court sanctions such as fines and custody.

To have cases accepted into Homeless Outreach Court, homeless individuals first have an intake interview with a paralegal from the Public Defender's Office, reviewing their past, what led them to homelessness and what their ultimate goals are. Once accepted into the program, participants are expected to come to court every two to three months to discuss their progress, struggles and achievements.

Each session begins with a raffle of \$5 restaurant gift cards and bus passes, creating an engaging and welcoming environment.

"Getting people here is half the battle," said Julie Doran, OC Superior Court Collaborative Court Coordinator. "Once homeless individuals are here at Homeless Outreach Court sessions, then the major focus is on connecting them with the services they need."

Next, each program participant is called to the front of the courtroom. As Public

Homeless Outreach Court is a Collaborative Court program offered by the Orange County Superior Court, in collaboration with the Public Defender, the District Attorney, the Health Care Agency, the Social Services Agency, the Public Law Center, the Veterans Administration, the County Department of Housing and Community Services, and several homeless service providers.

# Homeless Outreach Court (Continued)

Defenders provide updates on each person's case, the entire courtroom erupts in applause – whether to welcome new program participants, to recognize milestones such as finding jobs or housing, or to celebrate cases that are dismissed upon program completion.

"This homeless court is one of the best things that has happened to me," said a veteran working through the court's partner organization to obtain Social Services and Veteran Administration benefits.

Seeing Homeless Outreach Court participants successfully complete the program — and not return to her courtroom — is what drives Superior Court Judge Mary Kreber Varipapa, who presides over the court.

"You just don't see this kind of success anywhere else," said Judge Kreber Varipapa, noting that the recidivism rated for Collaborative Court program graduates are far lower than in traditional courts. "When you see the individual success stories of people pulling their lives together, it's amazing."

# HUD Assistant Deputy Secretary Tours OC Homeless Shelters

On Wednesday, December 6, 2017, Supervisor Andrew Do, First District, hosted a tour of Orange County's homeless shelters for the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development Assistant Deputy Secretary Ralph Gaines. This was in follow up to Supervisor's Washington D.C advocacy trip last month, where he met with officials and elected representatives to discuss issues pertinent to Orange County.

The tour showcased the Courtyard Transitional Center in Santa Ana and Bridges at Kraemer Place in Anaheim, each being the first shelter of their kind in Orange County. Both of these facilities were opened within the last two years as part of the County's response to the growing homelessness crisis facing Southern California. These facilities were the first that Assistant Deputy Secretary Gaines had seen with wraparound and linked services like mental health services, housing navigation, public health nurses and employment opportunities.

This is the second of many meetings to come to continue working together on finding solutions to homelessness in Orange County.





# 2017 Point In Time Estimates Show Significant Geographical Variations in Our Progress Toward Ending Homelessness



On Wednesday, December 6, 2017, the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) released its report summarizing the data from communities' 2017 Point In Time (PIT) Counts, reporting a mix of results. The estimates provided by this data indicate there was continued progress in many parts of the country, but finds indications of stalled progress or significant increases in some communities. Further, the data documents important progress in ending homelessness for families with children, but stalled progress for veterans, and significant increases for people with disabilities who are experiencing chronic homelessness. These results appear to have been impacted significantly by limited supply and increasing rents in many large urban areas across the country.

### **Estimates**

The estimates for different populations experiencing homelessness include:

- The estimate of the total number of people experiencing homelessness on a single night was 553,742 people. This represented an increase for the first time in seven years - up a little less than 1 percent (or 3,814 people) after declining 14 percent between 2010 and 2016. This increase is driven entirely by a 9 percent increase in unsheltered homelessness.
- The number of families with children experiencing homelessness was reduced by 5 percent (or 3,294 households) between 2016 and 2017, contributing to an encouraging 27 percent reduction between 2010 and 2017.
- Estimated homelessness among veterans ticked up slightly - by 1.5 percent or 585 veterans - stalling the 47 percent reduction in veteran homelessness between 2010 and 2016.
- The number of individuals estimated to be experiencing chronic homelessness went up by 12 percent (or 9,476 individuals), after declining 27 percent between 2010 and 2016, which appears to be both driven by worsening conditions and by efforts in many communities to more accurately determine which people meet the definition of chronic homelessness.
- There were an estimated 40,799 unaccompanied youth under the age of 25 experiencing homelessness. This number will serve as the baseline for assessing progress on youth homelessness within the PIT counts in the years ahead.



# **Regional Variations**

There is a great deal of local and regional variation in the data this year, with a small number of communities having a large impact on the national totals and with continued indications of progress in much of the country.

- Sixty percent of Continuums of Care (237 CoCs) reported that they had reduced total homelessness, while 40 percent (162 CoCs) reported increases.
- 30 states and the District of Columbia reported that they had reduced total homelessness, while 20 states reported increases.
- The increase in homelessness nationwide has been driven primarily by increases in unsheltered homelessness among individuals in some communities, especially along the West Coast, that are facing significant challenges within their rental markets. For example, if we remove the data from just a few high cost/low vacancy rental markets that reported large increases, the rest of the country reported an estimated 3 percent reduction in total homelessness, a 7 percent reduction in homelessness among families with children, a 6 percent reduction in homelessness among veterans, and a smaller increase of 4 percent in chronic homelessness.

But we also know that we can't overlook the challenging issues within many parts of the country that this data documents. It is clear to us that many of the forces that appear to be driving increases in homelessness in some communities cannot be solved by the agencies and programs dedicated to ending homelessness alone. High costs and low vacancy rates are putting more people at risk of entering homelessness and are making it harder and harder for people to find housing as they strive to exit homelessness.

Addressing those challenges requires a broader, communitywide response, engaging the efforts of many different jurisdictions, systems, agencies and sectors. Otherwise, our homelessness services systems will be increasingly bottlenecked by the lack of housing in which people can afford to live. We're seeing such bottlenecks forming already in some communities.

# **Ending Homelessness:**

Proven Strategies to Solve our Local Crisis

On Wednesday, November 15, 2017, a sold-out crowd of 200 business and civic leaders gathered at the OC Forum luncheon to hear from Andrae Bailey, CEO of Lead Homelessness Initiative, and his success with ending homelessness in Orange County, Florida. President and CEO of Orange County United Way Sue Parks made introductory remarks and Orange County resident Keith Morrison from NBC's "Dateline" moderated the talk, asking questions about helping the homeless and how best to do it. County of Orange Board of Supervisor Lisa Bartlett, Fifth District, representatives from Supervisor Andrew Do, First District, and Supervisor Shawn Nelson, Fourth District, and Director of Care Coordination Susan Price were in attendance. Bailey discussed his experience in addressing homelessness in Central Florida and how engaging top leaders in the community and changing perceptions of homelessness made an impact in his community.


# Going Home to Texas

A man in his mid-50s first became homeless in Southern California after losing his employment opportunity that brought him here from Texas. After having exhausted his limited resources and support network in Southern California, he stayed along the flood control channel. Through Flood Control Channel Engagement Initiative, he went to the established City Net access point seeking shelter in late-November. The City Net case manager referred him to the Courtyard Transitional Center, where he would stay for a few days. The City Net case manager continued working with him and determined the homeward bound program would be most beneficial for him as he had a support system waiting for him back home in Texas.

# Pathway Home

A woman in her late-50s experiencing homelessness sought shelter at the Fullerton Armory during the last winter season. At the closing of the Fullerton Armory, she transitioned to the Courtyard Transitional Shelter where she connected with City Net case managers. With City Net's assistance she connected with the County's Health Care Agency Program of Assertive Community Treatment (PACT) in Fullerton which was able to assist her in locating housing. In early November, the woman moved into her own apartment.

# From Finding a Medical Home to Moving into Their Own Home

A Public Health Nurse (PHN) assisted a couple while at the Courtyard Transitional Center with resolving a Medi-Cal problem, finding a source of medical care, accessing specialty care and obtaining housing. The PHN accompanied the couple to their first medical appointments to make sure all their medical needs were addressed. The PHN continued to meet with the couple for several months after which the individuals expressed their appreciation for the nurse's help with linking them to needed specialty care. The PHN also connected the couple to resources, which resulted in them being housed. The PHN will continue to follow up with the couple as needed to ensure continued access to medical care and community resources.

# **Employment Successes**

- A participant at Bridges at Kraemer Place was able to obtain a teaching position at a local elementary school. His salary as a teacher will be sufficient income to live comfortably in a one-bedroom apartment.
- Through Second Chance, a nonprofit that helps adults recovering from alcohol or substance use integrate back into society by providing job skills training, interview skills, oneon-one coaching, mentoring and job placement, an individual staying at Bridges at Kraemer Place was able to secure employment.

# **Housing Successes**

- With assistance from Mercy House, an individual staying at Bridges at Kraemer Place was able to obtain employment as a resident coordinator in Newport Beach. Shortly after securing employment, the individual was able to secure housing as well.
- Two individuals were able to obtain employment as live-in caregivers. Their employment positions as caregivers will provide housing arrangements, allowing them to move out of Bridges at Kraemer Place.

Individuals have moved into permanent housing since the opening of Bridges at Kraemer Place.

# Thanksgiving at Home

Two individuals experiencing homelessness first met along the flood control channel. They both lost their housing after having medical conditions that impacted their ability to work and pay rent. One of the individuals was awarded a Housing Choice Voucher from the County of Orange and was actively searching for an apartment and landlord that would accept the vouchers. Given their circumstances, the couple was having trouble securing an apartment in an already difficult housing market. Through the Flood Control Channel Engagement Initiative, City Net met the couple in July 2017 and was able to provide them bridge housing in partnership with Illumination Foundation. Having their basic needs met, the couple was able to focus their efforts and receive assistance from a housing navigator. Their persistent search and efforts paid off when they received a call from an apartment complex in Irvine accepting their application and voucher. The couple moved into their apartment just in time to celebrate the Thanksgiving holiday.



# Anaheim Community Triage Day

The City of Anaheim will be hosting a Community Triage Day on Tuesday, December 19, 2017, to provide supportive services and resources to individuals looking to break their cycle of homelessness and transition from the Santa Ana River Trail.


The attached figures show the recent trend of water consumption in Orange County (OC), an estimate of Tier 2 volume for MWDOC, and selected water supply information.

- Fig. 1 OC Water Usage, Monthly by Supply MWD imported water was the main supply in October, imported usage has increased due to the In Lieu program.
- Fig. 2 OC Water Usage, Monthly, Comparison to Previous Years Water usage in October 2017 was average compared to the last 5 years with the months of October 2015 and October 2016 showing lower usage. We are seeing a slight increase in overall water usage compared to the previous Fiscal Year. In June 2016, all water conservation became voluntary for MWDOC agencies and the Great California Drought was declared over by the Governor in April 2017.
- Fig. 3 Historical OC Water Consumption OC water consumption is projected to be 544,000 AF in FY 2017-18 (this includes ~15 TAF of agricultural usage and non-retail water agency usage). This is about 25,000 AF more than FY 2016-17 and is about 53,000 AF more than FY 2015-16 (During the SWRCB mandatory water restrictions). Water usage per person is projected to be slightly higher than in FY 2017-18 for Orange County at 152 gallons per day (This includes recycled water). Although OC population has increased 20% over the past two decades, water usage has not increased, on average. A long-term decrease in per-capita water usage is attributed mostly to Water Use Efficiency (water conservation) efforts.

MWDOC "Firm" Water Purchases, 2016 "Firm" water above the Tier 1 limit will be charged at the higher Tier 2 rate. Tier 2 purchases are zero in 2017.

<u>Water Supply Information</u> Includes data on Rainfall in OC; the OCWD Basin overdraft; Northern California and Colorado River Basin hydrologic data; the State Water Project (SWP) Allocation, and regional storage volumes. The data have implications for the magnitude of supplies from the three watersheds that are the principal sources of water for OC. Note that a hydrologic year is Oct. 1st through Sept. 30th.


- Orange County's accumulated rainfall through Early December was well below average for this period. Orange County saw rainfall 8 inches above normal in WY 2017.
- Northern California accumulated precipitation through Early December was around 113% of normal for this period. Water Year 2017 was the wettest water year on record. The Northern California snowpack has not been reported by the California Department of Water Resources as of December 6th. The State of California was in a declared Drought Emergency that started January 2014 and just recently ended in April of 2017. As of early December, only 8% of California is still suffering from moderate drought 31% of the state is experiencing abnormally dry conditions. The State Water Project Contractors initial Table A Allocation was set at 15% as of the end of November.
- Colorado River Basin accumulated precipitation through early December was 59% average for this period. The Upper Colorado Basin snowpack was 65% of normal as of December 4th. The Colorado River Basin saw above average conditions in WY 2017 but the region has been still trying to rebound from the previous long term drought. Lake Mead and Lake Powell combined have about 68% of their average storage volume for this time of year. If Lake Mead's level falls below a "trigger" limit 1,075 ft. at the end of a calendar year, then a shortage will be declared by the US Bureau of Reclamation (USBR), impacting Colorado River water deliveries to the Lower Basin states. As of late October, Lake Mead levels were 6.3' above the "trigger" limit. The USBR predicts that the end of 2017 or the end of 2018 will not hit the "trigger" level.




# Accumulated Precipitation



Dear Secretary Chao:

As members of the Orange County California Congressional delegation, we are writing in support of the Orange County Transportation Authority's (OCTA's) request for the Department of Transportation (DOT) to enter into a Full Funding Grant Agreement (FFGA) for the Santa Ana to Garden Grove Streetcar project (OC Streetcar Project) as provided for in the Capital Investment Grant (CIG) program, administered by the Federal Transportation Administration (FTA). This \$299.34 million project will allow significant economic investment nationwide, generating an estimated 6,500 jobs and considerable contracting opportunities for the private sector.

OCTA urgently needs the federal government's FFGA commitment in order to provide timely funding for critical upcoming Project activities and meet a projected opening date of December 2020. Construction Management and Quality Assurance Management contracts have been awarded and are underway. OCTA also has several planned contract awards and advertisements for vehicles, construction and operations and maintenance which must be awarded to meet the delivery target. A delay in the FFGA will slow these activities and create uncertainty to private sector cooperation, adding additional costs to the project. In addition, no committed federal or state funding for the project can be accessed without a FFGA between OCTA and FTA.

While a publically led project, the OC Streetcar Project has numerous private sector project stakeholders that are committed to the goal of improving America's infrastructure as efficiently and as quickly as possible. OCTA has a long-held Board policy to involve private contractors to the maximum extent feasible as part of their construction and operations activities. Private contractor employees make up over 91 percent of the current project workforce to date. All future project construction activities will be undertaken by private construction firms. The OCTA Board has also determined that the project operation and maintenance will be privately contracted.

We urge you to give this request for a FFGA for the OC Streetcar Project your full and fair consideration. This critical addition to America's transit infrastructure network is good for transportation and the economy. We look forward to any further discussion you may want regarding the merits of this project.







# Hotels project moves forward

The Garden Grove City Council approves a development agreement to build the resort near tourist attractions.

Plans for a 769-room, three-hotel resort in Garden Grove will move forward after the City Council approved a development agreement that hands over a 5.18-acre property to the developer for \$852,571 in fees.

The hotels, on Harbor Boulevard, are part of an overall strategy by the city to benefit from its proximity to Disneyland, the Anaheim Convention Center and other tourist attractions.

The project, spearheaded by Land & Design and the American subsidiary of the Shanghai Construction Group, includes three different hotels with 39,867 square feet of conference and meeting room space, 36,885 square feet of entertainment/restaurant space, and a 1,297-space parking structure.

It comes with a package of subsidies as part of an agreement approved in April 2013. In addition to giving the site, known as Site C, to the developer, the city will pay up to \$250,000 in improvements to the site and give the developer tax subsidies worth at least \$17.6 million. The city's former redevelopment agency paid \$15.6 million for the Site C property on the corner of Harbor Boulevard and Twintree Lane

The council voted 6-0 on Dec. 6, with Councilman Phat Bui absent, to approve the latest development agreement.

The vote was to set a five-year deadline for the developer to complete construction of the project. Details of the project itself were largely approved in previous agreements.

Residents who spoke at the special meeting Dec. 6 voiced a mixture of support and skepticism of the hotel project.

"I want to express my support and downright excitement for this project. It's been a long time coming," said Maureen Blackmun. "I look forward to the revenue and potential notoriety this will bring to the city."

A handful of employees of the Hyatt Regency, which was purchased by the Shanghai Construction Group America in 2015, also spoke in support of the project.

Meanwhile representatives of the hotel workers' union, UNITE HERE Local 11, asked the city to delay voting on the agreement.

"The developer is receiving significant subsidies without commensurate public benefit," said Danielle Wilson, a research analyst and organizer for the union.

Walter Muneton, a board trustee from the Garden Grove Unified School District, called on the council to establish a project labor agreement to ensure the use of union labor or other terms that would guarantee jobs to Garden

### **MAJOR TAX SUBSIDIES**

The hotels, restaurants and entertainment venues within the resort will benefit from tax rebates for 10 to 20 years, meaning a certain percentage of the annual taxes that they generate will be returned to the developer.

For example, the resort's main upscale hotel will receive a 20-year rebate of 60% of hotel bed taxes and half of all sales taxes it generates

Any subsequent hotels built on the property would receive a 10-year rebate of half of all hotel bed taxes and half of all sales taxes.

Restaurants and entertainment venues built on the resort would also benefit from a 50% sales tax rebate,

The city estimates that the project will bring in \$3.8 million to \$4.9 million in annual tax revenue a year.

Major subsidies to entice hotel development are not new to Garden Grove.

The city has poured \$100 million in public funds into the Great Wolf Resorts Water Park Hotel, including the \$20.8 million cost of acquiring and preparing the 10.3-acre property for development, then transferring it to the developer at no cost.

The developer also received a \$47 million lump sum from city redevelopment funds. Interest payments on the bonds financing that lump sum add another \$23 million in costs.

The Great Wolf and other hotel developments are part of the city's overall strategy of capitalizing on its proximity to the Anaheim Resort, which includes Disneyland, the Anaheim Convention Center and other attractions. The goal is to transform Harbor Boulevard in Garden Grove into an extension of the Anaheim Resort—sometimes marketed as "Anaheim West."

Hotel bed taxes make up a quarter of the city's total \$100-million budget.

"Twenty-five percent of our top-line revenue comes from hotel taxes. It's been an enormous windfall for this city," said Mayor Steve Jones. "It's been a hugely successful economic engine."

Council members all were supportive of the project.

"There's going to be union jobs on this and non-union jobs. It may be true that there's no guarantees but I've been assured there's room for everybody on this project," said Councilman John O'Neill,

Councilwoman Kim Nguyen said she was "very excited about the project" and was disappointed that residents critical of the project had not contacted her.

She also criticized tactics used by UNITE-HERE Local 11, which sent fliers to residents featuring a hammer and a sickle.

"Did you know that \$17.6 million of your tax dollars are supporting the development of three hotels by the Shanghai Construction Group, a company that is 60% owned by the Chinese Communist Party-dominated Shanghai Municipal State-Owned Assets Commission?" read one flier posted by a resident on Facebook.

Nguyen said it was "deplorable and disgraceful" for the union to use the Vietnamese community's experiences with a communist government to "instill fear" and "spread misinformation."

"It's not a joke, it's not funny, and I don't like that it was used," Nguyen said.





### Garden Grove Fire Department FIRE DEPARTMENT INCIDENTS

Firefighters have been busy this week with emergency response including two residential structure fires. The first occurred on Tuesday around 6:00 p.m. at a two story apartment building on Bolsa Avenue. The fire began in one unit, and quickly spread to a second. The fire prompted a three alarm response, with approximately 60 firefighters from Garden Grove, Fountain Valley, Huntington Beach, and the Orange County Fire Authority. It took crews an hour to extinguish the fire.

One adult resident was treated and transported to a hospital for smoke inhalation. The resident was stable at the time of transport. Families from six of the 14 apartments in the building have been displaced due to fire, smoke, and water damage from a broken pipe. That would include 12 people, 10 adults and two kids and two dogs. Red Cross was on scene to handle the relocation. Damage was estimated at \$350,000 to the structure and \$75,000 in contents.

The second structure fire occurred yesterday shortly before 4:00 p.m. in the 14000 block of Lake Street. GE7 arrived on scene, and reported heavy fire showing from an attached garage of a single story house. Firefighters initiated fire attack and a search for residents. Crews were able to isolate the fire primarily to the garage with minor extension to an attached bedroom.

The cause of the fire was undetermined at the time of the incident. Residents reported seeing the fire in the garage from inside the house and quickly evacuated. Fortunately there was no reported injury and underscores the importance of staying outside once you get out.
