
SEGMENT 1 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

Intersection of Harbor Blvd. and Westminster Ave. to Raitt St.

Over the next two weeks, Segment 1 construction activities will include:

- Preliminary work at the site of the future Maintenance Storage Facility
- Work within Pacific Electric Right-of-Way (PEROW)
- Santa Ana River Bridge construction
- Water pipeline work at the PEROW and Fairview Street
- Westminster Avenue Bridge construction

Water pipeline work will generally move west to east and will require temporary detours as well as lane and parking closures on W. Santa Ana Boulevard.



SEGMENT 2 CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES

Raitt St. to Parton St.

Over the next two weeks, Segment 2 construction activities will include:

- Water pipeline work at the intersection of W. Santa Ana Boulevard and Bristol Street
- · Water pipeline testing on W. Santa Ana Boulevard, from Shelton Street to Flower Street
- Water pipeline installation and testing on W. Santa Ana Boulevard, from Flower Street to Parton Street
- · Storm drain installation at the intersection of W. Santa Ana Boulevard and Raitt Street

Water pipeline work will generally move west to east and will require temporary detours as well as lane and parking closures on W. Santa Ana Boulevard. If visiting residents or businesses in the work zone, please ask crews to assist you in accessing the driveways. They can pull plates over the work area to facilitate entering and exiting.

Storm drain installation work will require temporary detours as well as lane and parking closures.





About the Project

OC Streetcar is the first modern streetcar project to be built in Orange County and will serve Santa Ana's historic and thriving downtown, which includes federal, state and local courthouses, government offices, colleges, an artists' village and a thriving restaurant scene. Expected to begin carrying passengers in 2022, it will operate along a 4.15-mile route that connects the Santa Ana Regional Transportation Center (SARTC) and a new transit hub at Harbor Boulevard and Westminster Avenue in Garden Grove.

GGUSD Celebrates the Lunar New Year in Annual Tet Parade







La Quinta Honors 1980 CIF-Champions




Enders Students Show Off Their Science Skills

Homelessness and housing are among issues in race for 1st District supervisor seat

Three candidates who hold city offices are challenging the reelection bid of Orange County 1st District Supervisor Andrew Do in the March 3 election: Westminster Councilman Sergio Contreras, Garden Grove Councilwoman Kim. Bernice Nguyen and Santa Ana Mayor Miguel Pulido.

The candidates are a diverse group in terms of their ages and personal backgrounds, as well as their professional experience.

Before Contreras, 45, was elected to the Westminster School Board and then City Council, he was a first-generation college student who learned hard work from his father, a longtime janitor at Disneyland. Contreras works as director of education and healthy schools for the Orange County United Way.

He said he helped bring all-day kindergarten to Westminster schools and prodded the city to update its general plan, but he still wants to serve the community. "My big mot-to's always been 'Do more with less.

Do, 56, became the second Vietnamese American to serve on the Board of Supervisors when he won the vacant 1st District seat in a special election in 2015; he was elected to a full term the following year. He's also a former prosecutor and business-

The goal of his next term, Do said, would be to see to completion initiatives he helped launch, such as adding two more Be Well OC centers, which bring together a comprehensive array of mental health and addiction recovery services. "This is not the time for someone to learn on the job. We have too many big issues that need solutions now,"

Nguyen, 28, who works as a health care policy administrator, is one of eight children in her family and the first to graduate from high school and college. Before winning a Garden Grove council seat in 2016, she worked on the city's

maps, which are intended to help level the playing field for minority groups whose voting power may be diluted in at-large elec-

Calling herself a fiscal conservative and consensus builder, Nguyen said she "knew from a very young age that I wanted to run for office" - in part to help change disparities in how immigrants and minorities are treated (her father is from Vietnam and her mother is from Mexico).

The candidate with the most elections under his belt is Pulido, 64, who has been on a ballot 15 times before. A mechanical engineer focusing on energy projects, he touts his record of improving Santa Ana, where he has held office for more than 20 years: he said he helped attract the Orange County School of the Arts and Discovery Cube science museum to town, and the city's crime rate and reputation are much better.

Voters "have seen the job that I've done, and I think in general the city is a much better city," Pulido said.

Continuing to address homelessness is among all four candidates' top prior-

Contreras said he believes the county can do more, but it's now playing catch-up after sitting on funding for homelessness and mental health programs with no plan for spending the resources.

He would ensure the county has plans in place and aggressively pursues money to build workforce housing, he said. "People first district-based voting shouldn't be driving from mailed beginning Monday.

Apple Valley to work here." Do said he helped write the 2018 state legislation that created the Orange County Housing Finance Trust, which is expected to speed up financing to build affordable homes for families and supportive housing for the homeless. However, there's still work to do, he said - not all cities have joined the trust and none has contributed funding. As for housing, Do said

the county has limited power to make it affordable, but it can encourage cities to build more affordable, higher-density hous-

Nguyen agrees with the need for more homeless shelter space, but she sides with Santa Ana residents who don't want any more in their city (the Courtyard opened 400 beds in 2016: the Link added 200 more in 2018). If the county could work with south Orange County cities, she said, they're sure to find an appropriate location but city buy-in is key.

To ease the housing crunch, Ngyuen said, of-ficials should get creative: consider allowing tiny homes, converted shipping containers or anything that will provide cheaper options.

Pulido also said the county needs to have a good relationship with cities to tackle what is a regional problem.

He said he supports using the state-owned Fairview Developmental Center in Costa Mesa to provide shelter and services for the homeless, noting, "There's some additional potential there that would relieve some pressure regionally."

Orange County's fivemember Board of Supervisors oversees a roughly \$6 billion budget that pays for services including law enforcement, elections, health care and public works. Supervisors serve four-year terms and are paid an annual salary of about \$162,000 plus health and retirement benefits.

If no candidate wins more than 50% of the votes, the top two will face each other in a November runoff, Ballots for the March 3 election were

team good luck as they competed for a league title.

"We had a phenomenal year last year, Garden Grove... and it's just the beginning," said Mayor Jones, echoing the words expressed by Bryant in the video.

Giving credit to the work of the Garden Grove City Council, Mayor Jones said, "The best example of teamwork making the dream work comes from my terrific City Council colleagues who have diligently worked to serve their districts and their city."

Pointing to partnerships built between the city and recognized names such as Arabian Prince, founder of the rap group NWA, and now eGaming business consultant, Mayor Jones said, "Throughout the course of our lives, there are special times when the stars align and we may find ourselves in exactly the right place, at the right time, surrounded by the right cast of characters all coming together in perfect harmony... to create truly magical outcomes."

Arabian Prince, who refers to Garden Grove as "Silicon Grove," has worked with the city to hold events similar to the TV show Shark Tank where tech entrepreneurs pitch their ideas to venture

capitalists. On Friday, Feb. 28, the city will collaborate with Arabian Prince to hold the "Esports Pitch Fest" at the Garden Grove Community Meeting Center.

Key projects, resulting from the successful collaborations between the city and business and community partners included: the School Resource Officer program with the Garden Grove Unified School District, placing specially-trained full-time Garden Grove Police Officers in local schools; the "22 and Beach" mixed-use center on Beach Boulevard, shared with the City of Stanton; and the newlyrelocated Kia Garden Grove dealership and the upcoming Home2 Suites by Hilton hotel, both located on Harbor Boulevard, south of the 22 Freeway.

"The City of Garden Grove and the City of Santa Ana have been strong supporters of a modern rail connection that will lessen traffic, reduce parking issues, and create greater access between both cities," said Mayor Jones, referring to the Orange County Transit Authority's (OCTA) ongoing OC Streetcar project. Mayor Jones, a long-standing OCTA Board Member, was recently named as the agency's new Chairman of the Board.

"Our sights now turn to a key development that I can't wait to see break ground in the not-so-

distant future," said Mayor Jones when talking about the unprecedented financial success of the Grove District-Anaheim Resort, and what is currently the City's largest development to date.

Anchored by the luxury, 4-star

hotel brands, Le Meridien by Marriott, and one of the largest Kimpton Hotels in the nation, the project, located on Harbor Boulevard, near Target, is expected to produce some of the largest revenues generated by the city's

resort area. Mayor Jones first announced both hotel brands during an earlier State of the City address.

City helps locals with roofing

Low-income families could qualify for \$20,000 loan

loan program of up to \$20,000 for qualifying low-income families.

Applications must be received by Monday, Feb. 24 to be considered.

The Re-Roof Program is a 20year deferred payment loan requiring no monthly payments, not exceeding \$20,000, which accrues 3-percent simple annual interest for the first five years of the loan. The loan is designed to assist with covering the replacement cost of a roof on a single-family home for qualified

low- and very low-income fami-

If the homeowner does not sell the home or default on the loan after five years, any accrued interest will be forgiven, and the interest rate will be set at 0 pecent for the remainder of the loan term.

In order to qualify for the Resingle-family Garden Grove home re-roof-program.

The city is now offering a re-roof with a roof that is in substandard condition as determined by a city building official. Applicants must also own and occupy the home throughout the term of the loan. In addition, the applicant must have a monthly debt to income ratio of less than 45 percent and meet the following income limits per number of persons in a household: 1) \$66,500; 2) \$76,000; 3) \$85,500; 4) \$94,950; 5) \$102,550; 6) \$110,150; 7) \$117,750; and 8) \$125,350.

> Participants of the re-roof loan program will be chosen through a random lottery to create the priority list. Ten applicants will be chosen, but those on the priority list will stay active for one year.

Rotary Club gives gift from and for the heart

Automated External Difibrillator donated to Assistance League

The Garden Grove Rotary Club continues its service to the community.

Garden Grove Assistance League members were invited to be guests for lunch at the Navy golf course in Garden Grove recently, where the Rotary Club donated an AED (Automated External Defibrillator) to their group for their facility.

Kris Backouris, Garden Grove Police Department community service officer with the Community Liaison Division, was on hand to demonstrate how to use the equipment.

The AED is a computerized device that can analyze a person's heart rhythm, then deliver an electric shock to restore a heartbeat. The AED gives directions through voice prompts and visual indicators and will not deliver a shock if the victim doesn't need

one, explained Backouris.

She further explained that when a heart isn't receiving enough oxygen or is injured, it can stop beating and become overwhelmed with chaotic electrical activity and then the victim can become unresponsive and will not be able to breathe.

"Although CPR can supply oxygen to the brain and vital organs to keep them alive, it usually cannot restore a heartbeat in an adult; CPR buys time until an AED can be used," Backouris said.

The more quickly a shock is given to the victim, the greater their chance of survival will be, with the most success being within three minutes after a cardiac arrest.

Backouris also demonstrated how CPR is as easy as C-A-B: Compressions, Airway and Breathing.

"Please keep up your skills and always be ready for the unexpected," he admonished other Rotary members and guests. "Hopefully you'll never need to use the AED, but if you do, you'll be more informed."

Diverse candidates ready for board race


Three hope to unseat OC's First District supervisor in March

Three candidates who hold city offices are challenging the reelection bid of Orange County First District Supervisor Andrew

Do in the March 3 election: Westminster Councilman Sergio Contreras, Garden Grove Councilwoman Kim Bernice Nguven and Santa Ana Mayor Miguel Pulido.



Before Contreras, 45, was elected to the Westminster School Board and then City Council, he was a first-generation college student who learned hard work from his father, a longtime janitor at Disneyland. Contreras works as director of education and healthy schools for the Orange County United Way.

He said he helped bring allday kindergarten to Westminster schools and prod-

ded the city to update its general plan, but he still wants to serve the community. "My big motto's always been 'do more with less."

Do, 56, became the second Vietnamese American to serve on the Board of Supervisors when he won the vacant First District seat in a special election in 2015; he was elected to a full term the following year. He's also a former prosecutor and businessman.

The goal of his next term, Do said, would be to see to completion initiatives he helped launch. such as adding two more Be Well OC centers, which bring together a comprehensive array of mental health and addiction recovery

services. "This is not the time for someone to learn on the job. We have too many big issues that need solutions now," Do said.

Nguyen, 28, who works as a health care policy adchildren in her family and the first to graduate high school and college. Các chương trình đang được sử dụng để giúp người mua nhà lần đầu tiên tại thành phố Garden Grove

Hiện tại thành phố có hai chương trình để giúp người mua nhà lần đầu tiên, và cả hai chương trình có thể áp dụng để mua nhà cùng một lúc.

-Chương trình WISH: Là phụ cấp giúp người mua nhà do ngân hàng Pacific Mercantile Bank điều hành. Phụ cấp từ chương trình này có thể lên tới \$22,000 (cao nhất) tùy vào mức đóng góp của người mua nhà. Cứ mỗi \$1 người mua nhà đóng góp, chương trình này sẽ cho thêm \$4. Số tiền này được sử dụng vào món tiền đặt cọc và tiền trả giấy tờ mua nhà. Nghĩa là nếu bạn bỏ ra \$1,000 để đặt cọc mua nhà, chương trình sẽ cho thêm \$4,000, tổng cộng lên tới \$5,000. Nhưng tổng số tiền bạn đặt cọc và tiền trợ cấp không vượt quá \$22,000, và mức thu nhập của gia đình không cao hơn 80% của mức thu nhập trong vùng Orange County (không quá \$78,320, trích từ =97900*.80 www.hcd.ca.gov/grants-funding/income-limits/state-and-federal-income-limits/docs/Income-Limits-2019.pdf).

Điều rất tốt đối với chương trình WISH là người thụ hưởng được cho bổng số tiền trợ cấp và không phải trả lại sau năm năm sống và làm chủ căn nhà đã mua.

-Chương trình CalHome: Là một chương trình của tiểu bang California giúp người có thu nhập thấp mua nhà qua trung gian của thành phố với tiền vay có phân lời thấp. Không phải thành phố nào cũng có chương trình này vì tiểu bang chỉ chọn những thành phố hội đủ điều kiện. Chương trình CalHome cho vay tối đa là \$60,000 với 3% tiền lãi đơn cố định (fixed interest) trong vòng 30 năm để phụ cấp khoảng cách giữa số tiền ngân hàng cho vay và khả năng tài chính của người mua nhà. Mặc dù chủ nhà không phải trả tiền lãi và vốn hằng tháng cho món nợ này trong suốt 30 năm, họ vẫn phải chịu tiền lãi 3%, là \$900, mỗi năm.

Cả hai chương trình đòi hỏi người mua nhà phải bỏ ra ít nhất 1% tiền riêng để được hưởng phúc lợi.

Người mua nhà có thể sử dụng hai chương trình cùng một lúc nếu hội đủ điều kiện

Thành phố Garden Grove dùng cả hai chương trình CalHome và WISH để giúp người mua nhà lần đầu tiên. Họ dùng tiền phụ cấp như là vốn để giúp người mua

nhà đặt cọc và tiền trả giấy tờ mua nhà. Ví dụ, bạn muốn mua một căn nhà trị giá \$500,000. Chi phí làm giấy tờ (closing cost) mua nhà khoảng 0.5% (\$25,000) của trị giá căn nhà. Tổng số tiền bạn cần có mua căn nhà đó là \$525,000. Nhưng ngân hàng chỉ cho bạn mượn \$420,000 dựa trên khả năng tài thu nhập và tài chính của bạn. Thành phố lúc này sẽ dùng \$82,000 từ hai chương trình CalHome và WISH để bù vào khoảng trõng. Số tiền còn thiếu \$23,000 (=\$525,000-\$420,000-\$82,000) ban phải tư bỏ ra.

Trong trường hợp này, bạn đã có hơn 20% (\$23,000+\$82,000/\$500,000) tiền đặt cọc nên bạn không phải trả tiền bảo hiểm vay mượn hằng tháng (PMI). Bảo hiểm này có thể lên tới \$400-\$500 mỗi tháng trong tiền nhà.

Tiền đặt cọc và chi phí mua nhà là nơi các chương trình mua nhà lần đầu tiên của thành phố và tiểu bang thường hay giúp vì các ngân hàng thường coi đó là món tiền vốn người mua nhà đã có sẵn nguồn cung cấp. Hơn nữa, người đi vay không phải trả tiền hằng tháng cho món tiền hỗ trợ từ tiểu bang và thành phố.

Những lệ phí và điều lệ cần biết khi mua nhà (closing cost)

Căn nhà có thể là món đồ mắc tiền nhất bạn mua trong cuộc đời bạn. Thường khi mua một món đồ, bạn phải chuẩn bị tiền trước. Nhưng trong trường hợp người có thu nhập thấp, làm sao bạn có tiền trước mà mua? Cách duy nhất là vay tiền từ ngân hàng để mua. Nhưng ngân hàng đầu dễ dàng gì cho vay nếu không có thế chấp. Ngân hàng thường dựa vào điểm tín dụng (credit score), tổng số thu nhập (income), tổng số nợ (debts) và tổng số tài sản (asset) của bạn để giám định nên cho ban mươn bao nhiêu.

Tín dụng có thể hiểu nôm na là lòng tin tưởng (trust). Ở Mỹ không ai biết ai, ngân hàng không biết người tiêu dùng có lịch sử tài chính như thế nào nên họ dựa vào điểm tín dụng để phán đoán mức độ tin tưởng của họ đối với người vay. Vì trong điểm tín dụng đó có lịch sử tiêu dùng, mượn nợ, trả nợ... của người đi vay.

Mua nhà ở Mỹ thường phải có 20% tiền đặt cọc (down payment) của giá nhà muốn mua. Ví dụ, nếu nhà có giá \$500,000 tiền đặt cọc là \$100,000. Trong trường hợp không đủ tiền đặt cọc, ngân hàng sẽ bắt bạn trả tiền bảo hiểm cho món tiền vay của bạn thường được gọi là PMI (Primary Mortgage Insurance). Trong trường hợp bạn không trả tiền vay và muốn bỏ căn nhà sau khi mua lại cho ngân hàng, bảo hiểm sẽ trả cho món tiền vay đó.

GARDEN GROVE, California (NV) – Thành phố Garden Grove đang có chương trình cho cư dân trong thành phố vay tiền sửa mái nhà lên tới \$20,000. Đơn xin vay phải nộp trước 5 giờ chiều Thứ Hai, 24 Tháng Hai, 2020, để được xem xét.

Theo thông báo của thành phố, 10 căn nhà sẽ được chọn theo chương trình xổ số (random lottery) từ các đơn gởi về để đưa vào danh sách ưu tiên. Những ai nằm trong danh sách này sẽ được ưu tiên cho vay trong một năm.

Chương trình cho vay sửa mái nhà chỉ dành cho những ai đang ở và làm chủ căn nhà riêng (single homes) thuộc thành phố Garden Grove, và phải có thu nhập thấp. Hơn nữa, trong thời gian vay mượn, người vay phải tại căn nhà đó. Tổng số nợ của người nộp đơn vay không vươt quá 45% tổng số thu nhập.

Quy định mức thu nhập của mỗi gia đình như sau:

-Nhà có 1 người, thu nhập không quá \$66,500/năm.

- -Nhà có 2 người, thu nhập không quá \$76,000/năm.
- -Nhà có 3 người, thu nhập không quá \$85,500/năm.
- -Nhà có 4 người, thu nhập không quá \$94,950/năm.
- -Nhà có 5 người, thu nhập không quá \$102,550/năm.
- -Nhà có 6 người, thu nhập không quá \$110,150/năm.
- -Nhà có 7 người, thu nhập không quá \$117,750/năm.
- -Nhà có 8 người, thu nhập không quá \$125,350/năm.

Số tiền cho vay có thể lên đến \$20,000 cho mỗi căn nhà có mái cần phải sửa chữa. Nhân viên thành phố sẽ giám định hiện trạng của mái nhà.

Mặc dù số tiền cho vay trong thời hạn 20 năm và người vay không phải trả tiền vốn và tiền lời hàng tháng, nhưng món nợ sẽ tăng lên với lãi suất tích lũy hàng năm (accrues annual interest) là 3% trong năm năm đầu tiên (khoảng \$3,000). Sau năm năm, tiền lãi là 0%. Và nếu chủ nhà không bán nhà hoặc bị default (không có tiền trả tiền vay nợ) sau năm năm, tiền lãi sẽ được bỏ qua, số tiền vay còn lai sẽ có tiền lãi là 0%.

ILG Releases 2019 Annual Report

February 5, 2020

2019 was a year of exciting growth and transition for the Institute for Local Government (ILG). California Cities Play an Important Role in an Accurate 2020 Census Count

February 5, 2020

California is one of the most diverse and populated states in the nation and the upcoming 2020 Census count is critical to the future of our cities and the services they provide.

League Executive Director Carolyn Coleman joined Secretary of State Alex Padilla, Assembly Member Marc Berman, and California Complete Count Director Ditas Katague for a wide-ranging conversation about the significance of the 2020 Census, and the importance of an accurate count at a Public Policy Institute of California Countdown to Census 2020 event on Feb. 3.

Every 10 years, as mandated by the U.S. Constitution, the federal government undertakes a census of the population to determine the allocation of seats held by each state in the U.S. House of Representatives. The next federal census will begin on April 1, 2020.

In addition to determining federal representation, the census is used to distribute federal funding to states and local governments. In California, dozens of vital federal programs that benefit our residents use census data and population counts as part of their funding formulas. These programs include the Community Development Block Grant Program, as well as key funding for roads, school programs and lunches, children's health insurance, Head Start and foster care. Each year, California can receive as much as \$77 billion in census-related funding, which is more than 80 percent of the total federal funds the state received.

To ensure that Californians receive their fair share of federal resources and congressional representation, cities throughout the state are collaborating with their local Complete Count Offices, as well as the statewide California Census Office, to encourage the full participation of all Californians in the Census 2020 count. California is home to some of the most hard-to-count communities in the country, and an inaccurate population count could result in a loss of the state's share of federal funding and, for the first time in California's history, a congressional seat.

Cities are encouraged to do what they can to ensure that everyone gets counted, which could include installing online response kiosk(s) in a publicly-accessible city building such as city hall or library, amplifying messages about the upcoming census using their city's social media platforms, and holding public events to promote civic engagement and participation in the 2020 Census. Cities should contact their census officials for additional ways to support the census effort.

During the fire pariet, coleman absence now cities play a cracial role in the 2020 cerbas count.

Cities can only provide vital essential services to maintain the livelihood of their communities if they receive the resources to fund those services. Coleman said, "Money is doled out based on population and certainly is something that is very important for cities. We, as a state, have to really come together and put a lot of bright minds at the table to make sure we have built an infrastructure to help prep for Census day."

Roughly 25 states have formed statewide Complete Count Committees, but California has truly prioritized ensuring a complete count of its residents. In the past two years, California has invested more than \$187 million in census preparation to ensure a complete and accurate count. In 2018, Coleman was appointed to the California Complete Count Committee, where she emphasizes the key role that cities play in helping the state prepare to overcome the challenges of reaching hard-to-count areas.

U.S. House of Representatives Release Infrastructure Framework to Rebuild with Communities

The U.S. House of Representatives leadership in Congress <u>announced</u> a new "Moving Forward" framework for a \$760 billion infrastructure bill on Jan. 29. The plan, over the next five years, would rebuild the nation's roads, bridges, transit systems, railways, airports, ports, inland waterways, wastewater and drinking water systems, brownfields, and broadband. The National League of Cities has been calling on Congress to "Rebuild <u>With Us"</u> and step up on infrastructure, and this framework reflects our shared priorities for rebuilding and creating a skilled workforce that will get projects moving in America's cities, towns, and villages.

Led by the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee Chair Rep. Peter DeFazio (Ore.), Energy and Commerce Committee Rep. Frank Pallone (NJ), and Ways and Means Committee Rep. Richard Neal (Mass.), the Moving Forward Framework is a joint effort to bring together the key pieces of infrastructure investment to "address some of the country's most urgent infrastructure needs, from addressing the massive maintenance backlog, to designing safer streets, to putting the U.S. on a path toward zero emissions from the transportation sector and increasing resiliency."

Local leaders across the country are glad to see this first step and will continue to call on Congress to turn this framework into reality.

"The National League of Cities has called on Congress to step up their infrastructure efforts and rebuild together with local leaders. The announcement of an infrastructure framework by the House infrastructure committees is great news for residents and communities across America," said NLC President Joe Buscaino, council member, Los Angeles, California. "Cities, towns and villages are ready to partner with Congress to bring a bold vision for transportation networks, water needs, and to invest in the skilled workforce needed to rebuild and reimagine the infrastructure in our communities. We must invest in our country and our people by building up the places that we call 'home,' and we applaud Chairmen DeFazio, Neal, and Pallone for leading with urgency."

Cities, towns, and villages look forward to working with both Democrats and Republicans to get an infrastructure deal done and on the president's desk. Finding a path towards a rebuilding, and reimagining our nation's infrastructure is an attainable goal, but it takes lots of voices from across the country standing together to move our efforts forward.
